# **Session descriptions:**

### Breaking the cycle: a more effective response to child exploitation and abuse

To break the cycle of exploitation and abuse, we need to target those ultimately responsible. By using creative approaches and making the most of the available legilsation, we can make sure perpetrators receive appropriate sentences for their crimes, while also helping to prevent them from targeting children and young people in the future.

This session is aimed at police officers, particularly responding officers and those who regularly have contact with young people in their role. In this session, we will:

- explore creative uses of available legislation, including civil orders
- consider whether current approaches such as focusing on drug possession and supply charges are the most effective
- discuss a multi-agency approach to disruption
- consider how positive interactions with exploited young people can both help safeguard them and lead to more successful investigations
- consider how being an effective first responder within the national referral mechanism can complement police investigations
- consider good practice in responding to exploited young people as they move into adulthood
- consider real life stories and good practice recommendations arising from these.

## Protecting all young people: why equity and inclusion are essential in our fight against child exploitation and abuse

While we have made real progress in the fight against child exploitation and abuse, we are still not protecting every child. By taking a proactive approach to equity and inclusion and making sure

we focus on preventing child exploitation as a whole, we can better reach and protect all young victims and make sure they get the right support from officers.

In this session, we will:

- consider the experiences of black young people and those from minoritised communities and how investing in trust building and developing anti-racist practice can improve our ability to prevent and disrupt exploitation and abuse
- discuss the gaps in recognising and protecting girls who experience criminal exploitation and boys experiencing sexual abuse and how to address these
- consider how to become more inclusive of transgender and non-binary young people, and effective approaches to engaging young people who are neurodiverse
- explore the importance of recognising victimhood in older children and young adults
- demonstrate the value of equity and inclusion in the fight against child exploitation and abuse, and the importance of taking a personcentred approach to every young person.
